NOVEMBER REPORT — *Turkey Coins*

Members were asked to bring coins *showing turkeys*, coins *described as turkeys*, or coins *which circulated in the area* that is now Turkey *during any era*. Here's what we got:

Herb brought a token acquired at an Alameda flea market which could be from San Francisco, but which was too damaged to be attributable with much certainty, and a common Venezuelan coin which had been slabbed by ANACS for reasons unknown and in spite of obvious surface problems.

Jason had an 1831 US half cent acquired in 1970s, which was



actually minted in 1834 but which had part of the last digit of the date trimmed away to make it appear much more rare.

Bob showed his ugliest national medal — the *Transpo 72* commemorative (see for yourself, above).

Federico had several banknotes from Turkey, and a box of dozens of uniface or otherwise unidentifiable tokens which he had acquired in the hope he could successfully research them, including one sheep shearing token, though all remain unattributable so far.

Stephen found two 1775 counterfeit British half-pence privately minted for circulation in the colonies. They surfaced among stuff packed away when he closed his SF office many years ago. They have not appreciated much over the decades since then.

Mark noted that, in El Salvador, turkeys had been used as guards. He also showed a “Spitting Eagle” CC-mint dollar, noting that many US dealers have never heard of this variety.
