The Worst Coin Portraits in History

Since (at least) the time of Alexander The Great, coins have frequently featured images of important figures. For example, British coins have featured an portrait of the current monarch for centuries. Circulating United States

coins only began featuring portraits in 1909; previous representations were of Lady Liberty.

Some of these portraits have been, shall we say, unflattering images of their subjects. Whether produced by untalented engravers, poor striking techniques, or subtle defiance, there are ample examples throughout history.

Join us online on **Wednesday, November 27** when **Stephen Huston** will reveal his picks of the worst coin portraits ever, including the coin shown at the left. Plan to exhibit your unflattering portrait coins, or your latest acquisition. So that everyone may participate, please take pictures of your exhibits to facilitate viewing on Zoom.



Speaker Ricardo De León Tallavas talked about the most famous coin of the Mexican Revolution, the "MUERA HUERTA" silver pesos. He reviewed a history of the revolution beginning in 1910. In 1913 Victoriano Huerta became president after a coup that imprisoned and executed the current president Madero and his vice president. He was aided by Mexican military generals and the U.S. Ambassador and was hated by most Mexicans because of his treacherous assassination of Madero.

This led to the minting of a peso coin with the motto "MUERA HUERTA" ("Death to Huerta"). Fascinating details about the crude design, who minted it and where it was minted, gold fantasy pieces made later, and legends about the coin were discussed. For a hundred years, the legend about the origin of the coin was that Pancho Villa had ordered the pesos to be minted.

An amazing discovery of a primary document tucked into a book previously owned by a Los Angeles dentist (and Father of Mexican Numismatics) Dr. Alberto F. Pradeau allowed Ricardo to make important determinations about these coins. The document proved conclusively that Pancho Villa did not order the MUERA HUERTA pesos to be minted, rather the pesos had been initiated by a different revolutionary warlord. There was an interesting discussion after his talk about various details of the coins and events..

Michael W started off the exhibits with a 1910 Mexican Independence Centennial Medal in silver, made by Tiffany & Co. He also showed a Mexican War New York Volunteer medal that had been engraved.

Bill showed us a 1944 anti-Hitler pinback. It was mechanical: pull down on a small lever and see Hitler rise hanging from a noose. It is likely a later reproduction of the original, but still an interesting item.

John showed us some new unlisted tokens from Holtville and Imperial, CA.

design medal, silver dollar sized. He just received it and was only able to order a single piece. The mint sold out of that one quickly. He also showed us a Hull Gala Day/ Boston Light House medal with a ribbon.

Mike M showed us a few Mexican silver proof one ounce bullion coins with Aztec designs, and Ricardo was able to help describe the design figures.
